Family awarded \$165,000 in rifle suit

A federal court jury awarded \$165,000 Friday to a Buffalo couple for injuries the wife received when she was shot by an allegedly defective rifle in November

In a previous trial, a jury awarded \$420,000 to Evelyn and Jack Lewy in their lawsuit against Remington Arms Co. Inc. However, the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals reversed the judgment because of an evidence problem.

On Friday, three men and three women jurors deliberated about an hour before returning awards of \$50,000 actual damages and \$75,000 punitive damages to Evelyn Lewy. The jury awarded \$40,000 actual damages to Jack Lewy.

Two alternate jurors also heard the case, which

opened two weeks ago in U.S. District Judge Russell G.

Clark's court.

"We're enormously pleased with the verdict," sai William H. McDonald, one of the Lewy's attorneys However, McDonald said he did not think th amount of damages reflects the harm and risk of th gun, a 700 model 30.06 bolt-action rifle.

McDonald had asked the jury to give the Lewy about \$3 million, including actual and punitive dan ages. The purpose of punitive damages is punishmen or deterrence.

Jack Headley of Kansas City, one of Remington lawyers, declined to comment.

The victims of the arson fire included a tecn-age mother and her 6. month-old son, whose bodies were found together in a bedroom closet. and and an elderly woman who was confined to a wheelchair.

Two other children and an adult

were killed. Two other occupants of the 21/2-story frame house were hospitalized, one in serious condition with burns. Four other people

fled without serious injury.

Neighbors speculated Friday that the fire might have been the result of a dispute between an occupant of the house and the operator of a drug house about a block away.

Sgt. Greg Mills, a police spokesman, said no motive had been es-tablished by Friday afternoon but acknowledged that the neighbor-

hood dispute was one thing bei probed by officers. He said t deaths were being investigated homicides.

"We're still evaluating differe angles. The investigation has a focused on any particular motive suspect," Mills said.

'Drugs could be involved in but if that's the case it's only o aspect of the feud," Mills s: 'We're not in a position to say t these two events - the fire and feud - are related."
