Dan,

We have a .308 700 that is malfunctioning. When the safety is in the fire position the firing pin moves forward while doing rapid bolt manipulation drills. I was able to recreate the problem in the shop. I sonic cleaned the bolt and trigger group and blew it out with compressed air, lubricated it and reassembled it (rifle not the trigger group) and

it still would repeat this malfunction. Do I need a service authorization number? Who what and where do I send the rifle.

The rifle was used on March 17 2008 in a deadly force deployment and it performed correctly. This malfunction was detected at a training shoot early this month.
