4 A. No.

5 Q. You've never seen any minutes which discussed the  
6 fact that Remington rifles, the Model 700 rifles would fire  
7 about one percent of them would fire upon release of safety?

8 A. No.

9 Q. If those minutes did exist, given the number of  
10 Remington rifles, Model 700 rifles in the field, that would  
11 be many more than 20 complaints a year, wouldn't it?

12 A. Yes, it would.

13 Q. Would a situation that Remington, by its own  
14 estimates, states that about one percent of its Model 700's  
15 are susceptible, would that be an acceptable risk to  
16 Remington?

17 A. No.

18 Q. Do you think if that was the situation, Remington  
19 should look into redesigning these rifles?

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. And do you think if that were the situation,  
22 Remington should look into recalling those which are already  
23 on the market?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. Do you feel that a rifle which fails the FSR test

1 would be defective?

2 A. If it failed it, yes.

3 Q. Do you feel that a rifle - Model 700 rifle here,  
4 I'm talking about - if it fails the trick test would be  
5 defective?

6 A. Possible.

7 MR. KAISER: For the record, we're out of video at  
8 this point.

9 BY MR. MILLER:

10 Q. You say it's possible that a rifle which failed  
11 the trick test would be defective?

12 A. Failing the trick test, under the present  
13 manufacturing conditions, it seems to me would be  
14 impossible.

15 Q. Let's assume that a Model 700 does fail the trick  
16 test, would you consider that rifle to be defective?

17 A. Yes.

18 Q. And I asked you a question before about your  
19 feelings on rifles if one percent of Remington's Model 700's  
20 would fire on release of safety. I want to ask you those  
21 same questions. If Remington estimates that one percent of  
22 its rifles would fail the trick test, one percent of its  
23 Model 700's, do you think that's something they should look  
24 into?

25 A. That would require a redesign.

1 Q. And if Remington estimates that one percent of its  
2 rifles would fail the trick test, the Model 700 rifles, do  
3 you feel that would justify a recall of those rifles?

4 A. Yes, it would.

5 Q. How about if the figure were as low at 4/10 of a  
6 percent?

7 A. I think that would also classify as a recall.

8 Q. And 6/10 would, of course, as well; 6/10 of a  
9 percent would, as well?

10 A. Yes.

11 Q. That would require a recall?

12 A. Yes.

13 MR. WARE: Off the record.

14 (After a recess, the deposition continued as  
15 follows:)

16 BY MR. MILLER:

17 Q. Back on the record with some questions after we  
18 played the tape and picked up on the video camera where we  
19 ran out of video tape. Was an optical comparator used in  
20 the manufacturing process in 1975, when you retired?

22 Q. Was an optical comparator, the machine called an  
23 optical comparator, used in the manufacturing or quality
