Your Remington Model 700 was made in April of 1980. This would confirm the story of the gentleman from whom you purchased the rifle. The barrel is not supposed to be free floated. The stock is designed to have a "pressure point" towards the end. We have found in testing that our firearms tend to have more reliable accuracy without free floating the barrels. However, it should not touch any other place but that.

Your firearm is also eligible for the Safety Modification program. On any pre-1982 Model 700, you can send in your firearm and we will modify it so that you can load and unload your firearm with the safety on. The cost is \$20 per firearm through the end of the Year. You can find the details here:
