8. Probably one of the most interesting phases of the information uncovered by this study is the apparently unresolved matter of safeties on rifles

A little background is necessary. When the questionnaire was designed there were six shotgun safeties to offer the public for consideration as against five rifle safeties.

To balance the page, a sketch of a sliding catch safety on the small of the grip (the usual double barrel shot-gun safety) was inserted among the rifle safeties.

No rifle with such a safety has, as far as we know, ever been offered to the public.

The reason for this word of explanation is that this particular safety pulled more "preference votes" than any other, as follows:
