

gathered is insufficient to serve as a base for conclusions. A single barrel shotgun in one or more gauges may be a desirable addition to the Remington line. Further study along these lines is indicated.

2. That pistol grips be continued in post war models.
3. That fore-end designs be studied to increase their acceptance by consumer.
4. That shotgun stocks be brown (walnut color), medium to dark in shade, and dull in finish.
5. That shotgun barrels be blue-black in color, dull, and with a velvet texture.
6. That study be applied to the possibility of developing a sliding catch safety on the top of the grip for pump and autoloading shotguns.
7. That double barrel and over-and-under models retailing at over \$50.00 be offered with single or double triggers--the single trigger arrangement to add from \$10 to \$13 to the retail price.
8. That shotguns selling above \$35 be checkered.
9. That 12 gauge and 16 gauge shotguns be marketed equipped with recoil pads.
10. That post war shotguns be designed to weigh about as follows:

12 Gauge	7.1 pounds
16 Gauge	6.8 pounds
20 Gauge	6.6 pounds
28 Gauge	6.1 pounds
410 Gauge	6.0 pounds

That study be given to the possibility of marketing companion guns--"matched" rifles and shotguns of like exterior design, appearance and characteristics.
