

New Model Seven: Light Weight, Low Price and Strong Action



The most innovative centerfire rifle in over a decade is waiting for hunters this year — the new Remington Model Seven.

Only 6¼ pounds, the Model Seven is Remington's lightest, most compact centerfire rifle ever. It took years of research to perfect the Seven's strong smooth bolt action. And it has the best power-to-weight ratio of any rifle made anywhere... a feature that is bound to make it a best-seller.

We didn't just take a heavy rifle and turn down or shorten the barrel to create the Seven. It resulted from a totally new, state-of-the-art design, combining light weight, and perfect balance for dependable, quick action.

As soon as your customers shoulder a

Model Seven, they'll recognize how solid, well-built — and amazingly light — it is.

The Seven is chambered for five modern high-performance calibers — 222 Rem., 243 Win., 6mm Rem., 7mm-08 Rem. and 308 Win. Its exclusive short action surrounds the cartridge head with three rings of solid steel.

The Model Seven is sensibly priced for your most cost-conscious customers, and it has all the marks of Remington quality. Its American walnut cut checkered stock features a slim fore-end with Schnabel tip. The free floating slim profile barrel is hand-bedded on one pressure point. Ordnance-grade steel has been used on everything from the Seven's fully enclosed bolt and extractor system to its steel trigger guard, hinged floor plate and 18 ½" slim tapered barrel. A ramp front sight, fully adjustable rear sight, sling swivel studs and rubber butt pad are standard.

There's an extra sales opportunity with the Seven: we've designed the grip cap to accept the popular customizing pewter inserts.

Every Model Seven has been individually test-fired to make sure it meets the accuracy standards of Remington's famous Model 700.

As light and quick handling as a traditional scabbard rifle, the Seven offers hunters improved, smoother action and a choice of high velocity calibers, at a price they can afford. With this entry into the lightweight rifle market, Remington's Model Seven gives you something really new for your customers this year.

Your sales efforts will be supported by a heavy advertising campaign in popular outdoor magazines. Initial shipments were made in December 1982 and all calibers will be in production by May 1983.

Model 1100 "Special Field" Created specially for upland hunters



The new Model 1100 "Special Field" will really make Remington "First in the Field" with upland hunters. These compact new 12 and 20 gauge autoloaders were designed just for them; the quickest, shortest, lightest Model 1100 ever.

The "Special Field" 21" barrel is the shortest vent-rib ever put on a full-sized 12 ga. field shorgun but it will deliver a down-range pattern comparable to a 28" or 30" barrel with the same choke. Combine that with the shortened, slimmed

fore-end and you have a gun that weighs a half pound less than other 12 ga. Model 1100s. The 20 ga. is the lightest Remington LT 20 available.

That means hunters get the speed they need for those fast upland birds. The 1100 "Special Field" shoulders quickly, points and swings smoothly, and delivers fast extra shots with low recoil.


The handsome new "Special Field" has a straight grip American walnut stock with a satin finish and distinctive full-pattern cut checkering. Like all 1100s, the "Special Field" is carefully engineered and balanced. It features an ordnance quality steel receiver and 4-shell total

capacity with a 3 shot factory plug. The 21" vent rib barrel is available with full, modified or improved cylinder choke.

The "Special Field" guns are versatile too. You can convert them into added sales by showing your customers the wide variety of rugged economical non-Magnum extra Model 1100 barrels that can make the "Special Field" into a waterfowl or big game hunting gun.
