The value ascribed to 'scopes varies materially by shooters' ratings:

"Gun nuts" (average)	\$31.72
Regular shooters	23.30
Occasional shooters	14.01
"Seldom" shooters	11.10.

With 'scope sights selling for an average of about 535.00 before the war, it seems apparent that the sportsmen who shoct only occasionally or seldom don't know what it would cost them to have their new rifles equipped with 'scopes.

Perhaps, then, if 'scopes sell at pre-war prices after the war, a number of the "occasional" and "seldom" shooters may abandon the idea.

Thus the 32.21% should perhaps be taken with a grain of rock salt.

18. Drill the barrel for 'scope mounts -

Whereas 32.21% of the respondents specified 'scope sights (although their ideas of prices of 'scopes are probably on the low side), a total of 57.76% of rifle respondents said that they wanted the barrels of their rifles to be drilled for 'scope mounts.

This last figure is 79% higher than the number of sportsmen who want 'scopes. Apparently an appreciable percentage of respondents want to be on the safe side in case they later want to install 'scopes.

The average value ascribed to the barrel drilled for 'scope mounts is as follows:
