Had the 300 Series finish been inadequate, I presume we would have been subjected to considerable complaints hitherto now. Our only guess at this time is that the finish on the sample gun was in some respect not representative of the standard 300 Series finish. We will look into this matter and advise you.

Further reference is made to your letter of January 9th on the test firing of the .300 Nagam 1/2. At Mr. Nagle's request, this gun was returned to Subsequent on January 9th for further examination and testing. We will be interested in the findings of this test.
