ACCURACY TESTING

He E. Leek has brought to my attention the extreme meed for standard guns and miscellaneous equipment to permit more reliable outdoor accuracy testing. I would like to suggest a meeting in the Com Boom at he class on Fuesday, total 13th to discuss this problem. People receiving copies of this letter are asked to attend. The following are involved:

I be called

- 1. Standard Gams We should provide bull gams (heavy barrel) in all calibers in which we expect to get reliable accuracy information. At present these are 30-06, 300 Savage, 300 Hill Magma, 270 Minchester, 257 Rem. Roberts. With these gams we will be able to check on the shooter, amountains and scope variables. Accuracy testing would include firing the same amountains, same shooter and scope through the standard gum of the particular caliber and through the unknown gum (model, pilot or regular production). Results would be expressed as max. possible (that is, bull gum results) vs. actual performance for unknown gum.
- 2. Beach Rest Two beach rests of sturdy design should be built for this work. The present beach rest is the personal property of R. K. Leek and through extensive use it has now become unsatisfactory.
- 3. Sun Protection Outdoor abouting during the mext several months will be extremely uncomfortable unless some sort of umbrella or camppy protection is provided.
- 4. Trailer A small trailer should be provided to carry shooting rests, torget racks, unbrellies, amaunition and guns from the plant to the target area. We have in the past imposed upon the shooters to use personal cars which in turn damages the upholstery and trun doors of these cars. The amount of time required to clear those e uipment items to and from the plant is now a cossive.
- 5. Parmission to use target area. We have been making use of land owned by P. B. Butherford for this work. If we are to continue, some formal permit should be obtained covering this use.

it is recognized that accuracy is an estremaly important part of our test program. It is my personal opinion that we are uite fortunate in having
