SUBJECT: INTRODUCTION OF NEW PRODUCTS FOR 1963

In view of the importance to the company of the new Model 1100 shotgun and other new products proposed for announcement in 1963, it is felt that a special effort should be made to introduce these new items to the major gun and ammunition writers.

We believe that an intensive meeting at Lordship and Remington Farms during the hunting season would be the most effective means of accomplishing this objective. At the Lordship meeting, the writers would be given full details in a formal conference and would then be given an opportunity to shoot the Model 1100 at trap and skeet in comparison with competitive models and our older models. We would then take the group to Remington Farms in a chartered bus for a day of hunting and a further chance to try the 1100 on game. Because the writers would have a chance to meet with our public relations, sales, research and development and management representatives, as well as to try the new shotgun at this type of meeting, we feel that we would receive substantially more publicity than would result otherwise. This additional coverage should more than justify the cost.

As a matter of information, Winchester-Western has conducted similar meetings with these same writers during the past three years. Comments of people, with whom we have discussed these competitive meetings, have all been favorable and many of them have suggested that similar conferences on Remington products would be beneficial. Winchester-Western pays the travel expenses, board and lodging, and shooting expenses of those attending their meetings. It is felt that we should do the same.

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There are 23 writers we would like to invite. During the Bridgeport meeting, we would house these people at the Stratford Motor Inn, transporting them to and from Lordship by chartered bus. Because of housing limitations at Broadnox, we feel we should put them up at Great Oaks for the night they would spend at the Farms. Remington personnel attending could stay at Broadnox.

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It is proposed that we ask the writers to arrive here on Sunday night, November 25, attend the formal meeting at Lordship on Monday morning, shoot at Lordship on Monday afternoon, leave for the Farms about 3:00 p.m. on Monday afternoon arriving at Great Oaks for a late dinner, shoot on Tuesday morning and then leave by bus for the Baltimore airport on either Tuesday evening or Wednesday morning according to their choice.

Because we did not provide funds for such meetings in the budget, an additional appropriation would be required. The Traffic Department has computed round trip airline fares for those coming from a distance. We have computed mileage costs, at 8¢ per mile, for those who would probably drive. On this basis, costs of the meetings, above normal funds available for Public Relations' use at Remington Farms, are estimated as follows:
