I have looked over your suggested modifications for the XP-100 and they are certainly interesting. I am taking the liberty of referring them to Wayne Leek who is the designer of the original pistol. I'll certainly keep you apprised of any comments he may have.

There is no question in my mind that the balance is improved by your addition. However, I suspect that what you have done is to make a rifle out of this gun and not a hand gun. However, there may be some application of the general principles you advocate to designing a shoulder firearm which can be held more accurately than the present system. I am not enough of an engineer to know for sure but Wayne is.

Thanks again for your interest and the time you have spent on this.
