

We now sell barreled actions from our Custom Repair Department in Ilion. We sell the barreled action minus the trigger balance. The XP-100 does not have an adjustable trigger for pounds pull. The sear block spring and the trigger balance spring must both be overcome to release the sear from the sear block.

The trigger pull on the XP-100 is approx.  $I\frac{1}{4}$  pounds. Without the trigger balance and trigger balance spring it is approx. 3/4 pounds. The trigger balance prevents the trigger link from moving forward if the pistol is dropped muzzle first. The trigger balance is a required part in the XP-100 pistol. We do not now sell it with the barreled action.

The barreled actions are used for making bench rest rifles and unlimited class pistols for silhouette shooting by replacing the barrel and chambering it for various calibers. The bench rest rifle uses a different trigger assembly than the XP-100. The pistols used for silhouette shooting use XP-100 trigger assemblies. They are used without the trigger balance.

In discussing this with Mr. Robert Sperling he said that if we know they are being used this way we are obligated to tell the customer that the trigger balance is a required part of the complete action.

We can add literature to explain this to the consumer. We can make a bracket to attach the trigger balance to the bottom of the receiver; however, it could still be removed. According to our Legal Department this would not be any better than our present design legally. Therefore, the added notice would seem to be the best solution.

If we continue to sell barreled actions with the trigger balance we should furnish drawings showing how it should be positioned. The simplest solution would be to sell the pistol as a complete unit. The action presently sells for \$130.00 and the complete pistol for \$148.00.

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
