I have always viewed Remington's characteristic of having to cycle rounds through the chamber with the safety off as a negative, particularly with the ADL models. That's why I got a .308 model with a drop door magazine. BTW, the web info on the 710 did not talk about how the safety operated. I hope you improved its operation so that the round in the chamber can be extracted without having to take the safety off.

My questions are:

Is the report from CBS credible?

If so, what is Remington doing to correct the situation?

Is this associated a problem with the basic design, only an issue with low temperatures or how the person lubricates the action, or only effecting specific range of serial numbers?

I know the media has an anti-gun slant, but I'm concerned if there is any truth to the report.

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
