From what you have described, this is normal operation. You can dry-fire our Model 700 rifles without damaging the firing pin. We hope this information will be helpful to you. Hi, Is it true that when a bolt action rifle is not cocked or after the firing pin is released, the safety switch cannot be put into "Safe" position? I have a 700 BDL in .30-06 call and the safety will move into "safe" position once the rifle is cocked, but will not go into "safe" position after I've dry-fired it and the gun is uncocked. Is this standard and normal for a bolt action rife?

Also I've heard that to uncock a 700 BBE without dry-firing it is to move the bolt forward and hold the trigger down while closing and locking the bolt. I've heard that by doing this it releases the firing pin in slow motion because dry-firing is not good for the mechanizm. Is this proper proceedure for uncocking the rifle without dry-firing it?
