Thank you for your inquiry. On older model firearms, our records only indicate date of manufacture, not the specific details regarding each model. According to the information provided, your firearm was manufactured in or around 1965. We do not recommend any alterations to your trigger assembly. We have a Safety Modification Program on certain model bolt action rifles. This is a voluntary program, it is not a recall. This is designed to remind people of the existence of the bolt-lock feature and to offer customers the opportunity to modernize their products.
